Class updates

Rabbits Class

We have really enjoyed our topic of '*Do Dragons Exist?*' and we can all say, with some confidence that yes, dragons *do* exist, just not the fire-breathing type. This was very reassuring to many of the children in the class. Talking of dragons, we have all loved getting involved in our key text for this topic- The Dragon Machine and have enjoyed writing about George and his amazing plan to help save the dragons. In History, we have looked at and built our own castles and have learned lots about the amazing defences that castles had. We learnt that many castles were built high up on hills or mountains so as to give a good view for the defenders. Talking of hills, in Geography, we have been learning about the different geological features around the world. We created a small model out of clay to show what these features look like- I'm sure these precious ornaments now take up the pride of place on your mantelpiece alongside the beautiful, junk modelled, Chinese dragon mask.

Hedgehogs Class

We have been focusing on History, studying World War II. In Literacy, we have read the classic Narnia novel, '*The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*'. This story has brought to the fore many issues confronted by children during the Second World War like rationing and being an evacuee. Some children experienced Turkish Delight for the first time and then used the experience to write a poem. Children made lifelike models of Spitfire aircraft used during the Battle of Britain. Remembrance Day took on new meaning for children this year, as they understood the importance of remembering those soldiers who died to protect us.

This term we were lucky to have Forest School on Wednesday afternoons. Even though it was cold and sometimes very wet, we did manage to have hot chocolate with biscuits and even marshmallows toasted on the fire. Grateful thank you to Mrs Harris, who is a master fire-maker. We learned a great deal spending time in the forest and were able to let our imaginations run wild, inventing interesting games and dramas. Next term, we look forward to having music lessons where we will learn the ukulele.

Foxes Class

This half term in Foxes has been a busy one. In seven weeks of fraction isn't enough to tire a class out, we don't know what is! We have been studying 'Beowulf' - the oldest poem known in English (Anglo-Saxon) literature, from which the children have written some wonderful descriptive paragraphs of its dramatic events. Further mythological learning has been in Guided Reading, where we have explored Greek gods and goddesses. In Art, we have studied the illustrator Victoria Topping to recreate our own God or Goddess in her distinctive style. However, according to the pupils, the highlight of this half term has been creating their amazing stalls for the Christmas Fair. They worked so hard to think of fun and rewarding games on a budget, and raised over £100 for the school as a result of their efforts.



FOSS news

Our FOSS team have been extremely busy this term with their incredible efforts raising funds for charitable organisations and our school. Their Macmillan coffee morning and cake sale raised £134, our book fair generated £190 for the school to spend on books for the library. The monthly cake raffle initiative has made £60 so far. The wreath-making event, which was very well supported by both parents and staff, raised nearly £350 and produced some works of art, as illustrated. The Christmas fair, which was a huge success, raised a whopping £400 in raffle ticket sales alone. The tireless work by the FOSS team has meant that they have been able to make a major contribution to both music lessons and the pantomime this term as well as other initiatives and equipment that enhance the children's life at Stedham Primary.
